Bahadur Shah Zafar History

Bahadur Shah II also know as Bahadur Shah II was born on 24 October 1775, in Shahjahanabad, Mughal Empire (Present-day Old Delhi, India). After the death of his father in 1837, he ascended the throne. However, it's important to note that by the time Bahadur Shah 2 became emperor, the Mughal Empire had significantly weakened and shrunk to a small area, which is now known as Old Delhi.

In addition to being a king, Bahadur Shah Zafar was a renowned and successful poet of the Urdu language. His talent in poetry is still appreciated today, as his works continue to be read with great interest in the Urdu literary world.

By 1857, the **British East India Company had taken control of most of India**, which led to growing resentment among the Indian population. The people were fed up with the brutalities inflicted by the British rulers.

in rifles. The British deliberately used such materials to provoke division among the Indian soldiers, as pigs are considered Haram in Islam and cows are sacred in Hinduism. As a result, many Indian soldiers refused to use these cartridges, leading to their dismissal from the army.

Rebellion of 1857

On March 29, 1857, an ordinary soldier named Mangal Pandey in Meerut refused to use the cartridges and attacked the British officers. This marked the <u>beginning of a rebellion</u> <u>1857</u> that the British called a mutiny or insurrection. However, this **event is remembered in India as the First War of Independence**.

The rebellion in Meerut soon spread across India, and soldiers from different regions began to rise against the British. Many powerful kings and local leaders declared Bahadur Shah Zafar as their emperor and decided to fight the war for independence under his leadership.

As the armies from various parts of India marched toward Delhi, the Mughal forces also sprang into action and declared war against the British. What began as a small spark quickly turned into a full-fledged war. However, the Indian forces were no match for the British army, which was equipped with advanced weapons of the time.

After four months of fierce fighting, the British forces succeeded in breaking through the Kashmiri Gate in Delhi. They entered the city, captured Bahadur Shah Zafar, and began a massacre. The British held a trial for Bahadur Shah Zafar in their court, declared him guilty, and ordered his exile from the country.

Death of Bahadur Shah Zafar

The frail old king knew that there was no point in proving his point to the British court as they had already made up their mind to punish him his only wish was to remain in Delhi to stay closer to his country but the east India Company did not grant his wish he and his whole family were imprisoned and sent to Rangoon in Burma for a life.
